New Business—

Moderator reflected back over the last year and now we need to set goals for our church. This evening we will be working through several discussion points and coming up with some goals. Moderator felt one of the most important roles for the OB would be to coordinate all committees and boards for better communications, with and between teams.

According to our Constitution, the Trustees are the ones responsible for keeping job descriptions up to date for all paid staff. Therefore, OB will need to push Trustees in completing the job descriptions for all staff ASAP.

Sharon requested that a Treasurer's Report on the Deacons' fund be given at our regular monthly meetings.

The remaining schedule for our United Church providing services at the Community Home are April 17, June 19, August 21, October 16, and December 18. Jack will be taking care of this.

Our next meeting is scheduled for April 13, 2011. The Meeting was adjourned.
