PASTORS CHAIR

A child shall lead them.

Who would've thought a lost sock would have created such a conversation. Easter Sunday morning was visited with a special moment of spontaneity. As families came to visit they brought their children with them. These little ones came forward to the front of the church without any reservation for the children's story. The simple question about a lost sock prompted what would become a visual illustration of the gentleness of the Spirit of God.

At one point I knew I had lost control of this moment with the children. At another point it was obvious that God had control of this moment. As various children responded with their viewpoints and their own stories one very clear message came through. The message of Jesus coming back after his death, his burial, and his resurrection was made clear as children talked about what they had lost and ultimately what was found.

Jesus came out of the tomb and appeared to Mary and then to the disciples. To Mary and to the disciples Jesus was lost; he was not to be found. In the midst of their fears, in the midst of their worst imagination Jesus was not where they thought he should be. Instead he came back and he found them.

The story is simple; a sock was put into the washing machine. It disappeared. One child told of a lost wallet (it was found in the washing machine), another about a lost toy, another about one of a lost sock. All the children chimed in with a sense of something to add as they understood that I had lost my sock. When I opened the washing machine with a whole different load of clothes in it, there at the conclusion of the wash cycle was my lost sock staring at me as if I was the one who had been lost and was now found.

The message of Easter is indeed about God finding us. It is the message of God seeking us in the life of Jesus Christ and ultimately after the death, burial, and the resurrection. The apostle Paul reminds us—where is thy sting? Jesus accompanied by these children declares the joy of that which was lost and is now found.

OFFICIAL BOARD MEETING NOTES

March 2011

Meeting called to order at 7:45 p.m. Moderator shared a devotional thought on "Bib or Apron". Agenda approved as emailed with no changes. February minutes approved as presented.

Board Reports

Treasurer – Reported a balance of \$39,278.04.

Deacons – Topics discussed at last meeting were education, request by Moderator for a pulpit committee and procedures for weddings.

Pastoral Relations – This has become more of a discussion group. Members are reading a book to help the Pastoral Relations Committee understand their duties and responsibilities. They are considering the possibility of hosting a workshop, inviting other congregations, which would look at issues related to pastoral relations and the roles of Committees.

Trustees – Work needs to be done ASAP on personnel job descriptions and a facility use policy. W.J. presented information on new heating controls for the church. Schmidt's has completed the eaves, gutters and fascia work.

Women's Fellowship – The last meeting was devoted to cleaning the kitchen. A Sunshine committee is being formed to send cards/items to shut-ins or those with ill health. The checking account has been closed and funds transferred to the General Fund account.

Christian Education – A Palm Sunday brunch will be provided by the Bd of Christian Ed. Looking at special events within the church, ie., Day of Prayer for Japan (provided by Missions and Bd of Christian Ed), marriage workshops.

Missions – The Women's Fellowship is taking over the responsibility of White Cross and Cordova; 5 packages have been mailed to the Congo and Haiti; Country Neighbors is ripping bandages; Pat will put a listing of all the missions we, as a church, support; the Blankets Plus collection was \$330.00, which will be used for 66 blankets to be sent to Japan.

Pastor – Reported there are approximately 105 members actively attending church out of a possibility of 700 plus. This means there are 105 resources to call on for projects. A new Resource Directory is being built to encompass a radius of 25 to 50 miles. The Website has been receiving inquiries to use the confirmation program by other congregations and individuals.

Personnel policies and building policies have been turned over to the Trustees. Discussions are being held regarding a 12 month calendar of events to be facilitated by the 3 boards – Trustees, Deacons, Christian Education.

Resource Directory – J.J. reported. She has been talking to several area churches and has been receiving much helpful information and resources for projects and events we can use at the United Church. The information is on the Website. We will be able to share staff, music, resources with other churches like ours.

Pulpit Committee – Moderator reported that he had received 48 names from the OB members. These individuals have not been contacted. Moderator passed out a sheet with the names, and each member present was to choose 7 from the list. Moderator will then combine the results.

Ambiance Work Group – This is more than a decoration committee. It will not encompass any thing external unless it will add to the religious feeling (manger scene at Christmas).

Goals – Moderator asked each member to rank the importance of the goals. After completion, these were handed back to Moderator.

New Directory – Pictures have been taken after church last several Sundays. They have a home-built lighting framework that could be set up and left from week to week. A room was designated on the main floor for this purpose.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

PULPIT COMMITTEE

The Pulpit Committee (also referred to as the Search committee) has been selected. Members include Warren Allevan, Dave Byram (committee secretary), Ruth Cumming (committee Chaplin), Doug Fritz, Lisa Shubert (committee chairperson), Sam Shubert and Bruce Stanton.

The committee has met with our UCC representative, Rev. Elena Larssen for direction on what to expect, what is needed and how to get started. She provided a manual to guide the committee through the process and answered many questions. Marshall Peters, our ABC representative, had been invited to this meeting but was unable to attend due to prior commitments. He will meet with the committee in May. The Pulpit Committee will work with both Elena and Marshall in the search process.

The committee is scheduled to meet again on Sunday, May 1st following the worship service. We will be starting our work on creating a profile of the United Church of Mapleton. In order to find the right "pastoral fit" for our church, as a congregation, we need to define a) who we currently are, b) who we want to be in the future, and c) what characteristics are needed in a pastor to accomplish this. In the next couple of months, the committee will be conducting surveys/questionnaires to help gather this information. Be assured, the committee is committed to providing confidentiality to all information being submitted to them whether in person, via email or as part of the survey.

Should you have any questions, concerns or comments you would like to share with the committee, please feel free to contact any member. Please keep this committee and the process of finding a new pastor in your prayers.

I HEARD A FOREST PRAYING

In 1937 popular songwriter Peter De Rose (whose famous tunes include “Deep Purple”) composed a musical setting for a poem by Sam M. Lewis. De Rose divided the four stanzas into three sections: “The Dream,” “The Prayer,” and “The Awakening.” These divisions point out the contrast between the inherent nobility of trees and the heartbreaking uses man makes of them— a tree was the cross for the Son of Man; forests are made into battlefields. (Interestingly enough, De Rose was later to compose a musical setting for a distinctly militaristic poem by Gen. George S. Patton Jr.) “I Heard a Forest Praying” was unique among De Rose’s songs, which were mostly romantic ballads. He and his wife, May Singhi Breen, used to sing his romantic songs on their radio show in the 1920’s and 1930’s, a show that earned them the sobriquet of “The Sweethearts of the Air.”

I heard a forest praying,
The trees were cold and bare
What was the forest saying,
Let me repeat their prayer

Trees make a playground for children,
Trees hide a lovers lane
Trees have been kind to the old folks,
Trees have not lived in vain

Man turned the fields of the forest
Into a battlefield grim
Man took a tree, an innocent tree,
And made a cross for Him!

I heard a forest praying
I heard the heavens weep,
Just as the dawn was graying
And night went home to sleep.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education continues to plan for growth at The United Church of Mapleton, with the main goal being that of life-long learning. In response to these fast-changing times, the C.E. Board, with the guidance of Pastor Carl DeLine and Moderator Hugo John, is searching for relevant curricula with appropriate and current delivery systems for all age groups and individuals. Specifically for Sunday School, for young children up to Grade Six, curriculum is being developed that follows the church lectionary. This curriculum will be placed on the church website and will be accessible to all who sign up to use this website. In this way, interesting materials will be made available to our children online – thus creating a “virtual” Christian classroom. Then, when children come to Sunday School at The United Church, they will experience more interactive games, crafts and activities to reinforce the online material.

This web-based experiment will also be applied to Adult Christian Education, including Bible studies, and possibly marriage preparation and marriage enrichment courses.

Christian Education will approach each subject matter with a “fresh start” philosophy. Short-term curricula will include topics such as “*Church Architecture and its religious implications*,” “*Religions of the World*,” “*Marriage Enrichment*” and “*Prayer and Creating/Composing Prayers*.”

The Board of Christian Education, along with the Missions Committee, sponsored our first “**Day of Prayer**” – (with a focus on Japan) during holy week. This event was very meaningful for many, and we wish to express appreciation to all who participated. Other special one-or-two-day events are being planned for this year, including a “*Workshop on Resources for Seniors*” and a “*Family Camping Retreat*.”

This year, the traditional **Palm Sunday Brunch** was very well received. The food was excellent, and the youth and children were terrific helpers and servers. Many thanks to all of you who helped make this year’s brunch a success. Over \$300 was gleaned to help defray the cost for our youth to attend camp and other retreat and mission trip opportunities this summer. Thanks again to all of you!

MISSIONS ~ CHURCH WORLD SERVICE

Your support for Church World Service work around the world and in the U.S. is urgently needed.

At the United Church *within this first week of May*, we will collect specific items to assemble Hygiene Kits, Baby Care Kits, and Emergency Clean-up Buckets. Items may be brought to the church foyer or to the kit assembly tables at the east end of the dining hall. The following items are needed.

Hygiene Kit: In the face of natural disasters, violence, or grinding poverty, Hygiene Kits can mean the difference between sickness and health for struggling families.

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper
- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- One toothbrush (in original packaging)
- Six standard size Band-Aids®

Place all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure, remove excess air from bag, and seal. Please do not add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Cartons of toothpaste that have an extended expiration date will be added to Hygiene Kit shipments just prior to shipment.

Hygiene Kit value: \$10

Processing/Shipping Cost: \$2 per Kit

Baby Care Kit: In areas of extreme poverty or following a natural disaster, Baby Care Kits help young mothers care for their newborn babies.

- Six cloth diapers
- Two T-shirts or undershirts (no onesies)
- Two washcloths
- Two gowns or sleepers
- Two diaper pins
- One sweater or sweatshirt
(Can be hand knitted or crocheted)
- Two receiving blankets (one can be a hand-knitted or crocheted baby blanket)

Items must be new and under 12 months in size. Wrap items inside one of the receiving blankets and secure with both diaper pins.

Baby Care Kit value: \$39

Processing/Shipping Cost: \$2 per Kit

Emergency Clean-up Bucket: These supplies enable people to begin the overwhelming job of cleaning up after a flood, hurricane, tornado, or other disaster here in the United States.

- One five-gallon bucket with re-sealable lid
- Five scouring pads
- Seven sponges, assorted sizes
- One scrub brush
- Eighteen cleaning towels (reusable, like Easy Wipes®)
- One 50-78 oz. box dry laundry detergent
- One 12 oz. bottle of liquid concentrated household cleaner (like Lysol®)
- One 25 oz. bottle liquid disinfectant dish soap (like Dawn®)
- One package of 48-50 clothespins
- Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- Five dust masks
- Two pairs latex gloves (like Playtex®)
- One pair work gloves
- 28-bag roll of heavy-duty trash bags (30-45 gallon)
- One 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent (pump, drops or lotion, not aerosol)

Please provide all liquids in new, unopened plastic bottles. Be sure to send only new materials. Place all items in the plastic bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment, and seal lid with packing tape. **Note:** Because of the volatility of the contents, Emergency Clean-up Kits are not shipped internationally.

Clean-up Bucket value: \$56

Processing/Shipping Cost: \$3 per Bucket

We can help Church World Service by assembling small packages of supplies to be shipped to people in need (Japan, Haiti, or around the world) for immediate response after disaster in another part of the world or in the U.S.

CHURCH WORLD SERVICE UPDATES

“Still Humanitarian Gaps in Japan Relief”

Thursday, April 21, 2011

Although overall relief efforts now are moving ahead as planned along Japan's quake and tsunami-decimated northeast coast, CWS and its Japanese partners are working to fill gaps, providing food, water, health and medical services, hygiene items, clothing and fuel.

Because of the severity and the scope of the crisis CWS has expanded its U.S. fund raising appeal, to support its response, which centers on emergency relief support to some 25,000 individuals living at 100 evacuation sites in northeastern Japan's Miyagi, Fukushima, Iwate, Ibaragi and Tochigi prefectures.

Takeshi Komino, CWS head of emergency response for the Asia/Pacific Region, said four 10-ton trucks were loaded with supplies in Tokyo and delivered to at least 10,000 people in Miyagi's Ishinomaki and Kesunuma cities. An estimated 135,000 people are living in registered evacuation sites across Japan; thousands more may be living in unregistered sites.

Haiti

Church World Service responded immediately after the Jan. 12 earthquake in Haiti, and CWS is committed to serving the survivors in the long process of rebuilding and recovery. Herode Guillomettre, president of the Christian Center for Integrated Development urged CWS and its supporters to “continue to stand behind the Haitian people, by developing a relationship that goes beyond partnership.” He wants the Haitian people to be active in their own development, to end their dependency.

Currently, more than a year since the January 2010 earthquake in Haiti, hundreds of thousands of people are still living in tents in Port-au-Prince and other locations. With local partners, CWS is supporting several long-term initiatives in Haiti.

Response to Nature's Fury Ramps Up in U.S.

High winds, tornadoes, floods and wildfires continue to hammer several regions of the United States, causing severe damage and loss of life. Government officials are assessing the full extent of damage to the communities affected, and CWS Emergency

Response Specialists are working with FEMA and area-specific disaster relief organizations to determine how best to help. States affected include: North Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, Virginia, Wisconsin, South Dakota, Illinois, Missouri, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Kentucky, Arkansas, Texas, New Mexico, Minnesota, North Dakota, New York, Iowa, and Virginia.

In addition to providing hygiene kits, emergency clean-up buckets and blankets are needed. CWS will also help communities develop long-term recovery plans as requested

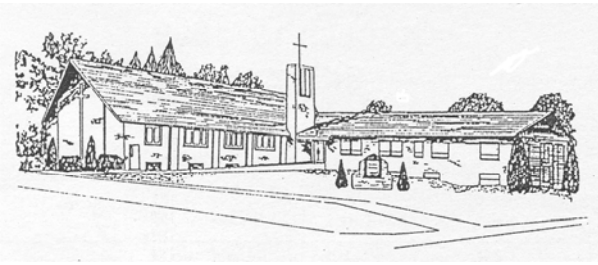
YOUTH ACTIVITY

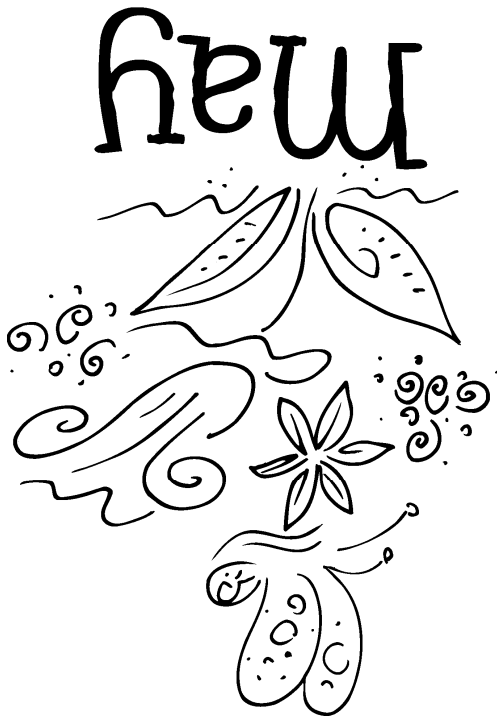
